

# How "English" is Queen Elizabeth II?

Here are some facts:

Ernst August von Braunschweig-Calenberg (1629-1698), who held the title "Elector of Hanover", was a descendant of Henry VIII (1491–1547). He would have become an heir to the English Throne (Thronfolger) on the death Queen Anne in 1714 if he had not died sixteen years earlier. In 1714, England needed a new monarch, male or female. The Act of Settlement of 1701 stipulated that future monarchs would have to be Protestants (i.e. members of the Church of England). Thus, any Roman Catholic claimants to the English Throne were disqualified. The eldest son of Ernst August, Georg Ludwig von Braunschweig-Lüneburg, took over the title "Elector of Hanover" when his father died. Like his father before him, he was a suitable candidate for the English Throne. In 1714, Georg Ludwig, Elector of Hanover, became George I of Great Britain and Ireland. George I (who spoke German and French, but very little English) was the first king of the so-called House of Hanover. His son became George II in 1727. The grandson of George II became George III in 1760. The eldest son of George III became George IV in 1820.

Although they were by nationality Englishmen, all four Georges maintained strong ties to their principality in Hanover. Each of them was married to a wife from the German aristocracy. Thus, they remained essentially German. George IV's brother, Edward Duke of Kent, married Victoria, who was a daughter of one of the dukes of Sachsen-Coburg-Saalfeld and the widow of the Prince of Leiningen. The eldest daughter of Edward and Victoria was born in 1819. She was also called Victoria and was to become the successor to William IV, who was a brother of George IV and the last king of the House of Hanover. In 1837, when she was only

18 years old, she became Queen Victoria of Great Britain and Ireland. In 1877, she acquired the additional title "Empress of India". Thus, Queen Victoria's mother was German and her father was

of German descent.

Queen Victoria married Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha in 1840. They had nine children, all of whom



married into royal or noble families throughout Europe. Victoria was known as the "Grandmother of Europe". In the succeeding generations, the family relationships were such that King George V, Victoria's grandson, was a cousin of both Kaiser Wilhelm II and Tsar Nicolas II of Russia.

Queen Victoria was the last monarch of the House of Hanover. After her death in 1901, she was succeeded by her eldest son, Edward VII. The English Royal House was renamed "The House of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha", after King Edward's father. Edward VII was succeeded in 1910 by George V. Like the previous George's of the House of Hanover, George V had a German wife. It was George V who changed the name of the English Royal House from Saxe-Coburg and Gotha to "Windsor". George V was succeeded in January 1936 by Edward VIII, who was Queen Elizabeth's uncle. Edward VIII was succeeded in December of the same year by his brother, George VI, who was Queen Elizabeth's father. When George VI died in February 1952, Elizabeth became queen; she was 25 years of age. The Coronation took place in the following year on 2 June.


Elizabeth II married Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, in 1947. Prince Philip was born on the Greek island of Corfu in 1921. He was the only son of Prince Andrew of Greece and Denmark and Princess Alice of Battenberg. Through his mother, he is partially of German descent. Both Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip are great-great grandchildren of Queen Victoria.

This month's project by Photography 1 was our interpretation of "BLUE". Of course, this can be interpreted by everyone in different ways, which leads to some rather unusual pictures.




























